SUBJECT: RESULTS OF THE 2009 ACT ASSESSMENT

On August 19, 2009, ACT, Inc. released District, state, and national ACT Assessment (ACT) results for the 2009 graduating class. These results summarize the performance of the 2009 graduating seniors who may have taken the ACT Assessment as sophomores, juniors, and/or seniors. For students who took the test more than once, only the most recent test scores are included in the analyses. Results are included for students who tested under standard time conditions and reported at the time of testing that they were scheduled to graduate in 2009. The results for the class of 2009 are compared to those of their counterparts in the class of 2008.

Approximately 49% of the students in the class of 2009 took the ACT college readiness assessment, up from 43% in the class of 2008. This represents an increase from 9,762 students in 2008 to 11,513 students in 2009. Highlights of the results and a summary of the results for individual schools are provided as attachments to this memorandum. Individual High School Profile Reports are being sent to the principal at each high school with one or more ACT-tested graduates. National and state 2009 ACT High School Profile Reports may be accessed on ACT's website at: http://www.act.org/news/data09.

As with all college entrance exams, the population tested consists of self-selected students who participate on a voluntary basis. As a result, student demographic characteristics and the number and percent of students tested at each school can vary greatly both among schools and from year to year. Therefore, caution should be used in making comparisons, particularly in schools with relatively low numbers of students tested. In addition, these reports are not indicative of the results that will be used in the new high school accountability component for postsecondary readiness, which will include the highest score received on college placement tests by any enrolled student, not just graduating seniors.

Highlights of the ACT Assessment Results Summary Report for Miami-Dade County Graduating Class of 2009

District Results

- The percentage of students participating in the ACT Assessment increased from 43% in the graduating class of 2008 to 49% in the class of 2009.
- At both the state and District levels, the mean ACT scores decreased slightly from 2008 to 2009 in all content areas including the Composite score.
- The national mean score in Science increased slightly and remained stable in all other content areas in 2009 including the Composite score.
- For all reported scores, the national mean scores were highest, followed by the state's and then the District's scores.

Individual School Results

- Students in the graduating class of 2009 participated in the ACT Assessment at 65 schools in the District.
- Thirty-two percent (32%), or 18 of the 56 high schools with ten or more participating students, had Composite scores at or above the state mean of 19.5.
- Fourteen percent (14%), or 8 of the 56 high schools with ten or more participating students, had Composite scores at or above the national mean of 21.1.

MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS Summary of District, State and National Results for the ACT Assessment Graduating Class of 2009

On August 19, 2009, ACT, Inc. released District, state, and national results from students in the 2009 graduating class who chose to participate in the ACT Assessment. This report provides information for the 2009 graduating seniors who took the ACT as sophomores, juniors, and/or seniors and who reported at the time of testing that they were scheduled to graduate in 2009 and tested under standard time conditions. Test records for students who tested under extended time conditions are not included. The ACT is a curriculum-based measure of college readiness which includes subtests in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. ACT scores can range from a low of 1 to a high of 36.

The 2009 ACT mean scores for the English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science test sections, as well as the overall Composite scores, are presented in Table 1 for the District, the state, and the nation. Individual school ACT results for the Class of 2009 are presented in Table 2. This table displays the number of test-takers at each school, as well as the mean scores for each subject area test and the accompanying Composite score. School summary score results are not presented if fewer than 10 students participated; however, the data for these schools are included in the District and state results.
