2013-2014 SCHOOL PERFORMANCE GRADES

Today the Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) released the School Performance Grades for Elementary, K-8 and Middle Schools, highlighting the performance of Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS); see attached press release. Results include:

- Higher percentages of M-DCPS schools received School Performance Grades of "A" in comparison to the state and other large districts, while lower percentages received "F."
 - 43% of M-DCPS schools received a School Performance Grade of "A," while only 5% received an "F."
- M-DCPS schools also improved at a greater rate than the state and other large districts.
 - The percentage of schools receiving School Performance Grades of "A" increased by 8 percentage points, outpacing the state and other large districts.
- M-DCPS continued a trend of improved performance, increasing its total points earned from 495 to 506, to maintain its high performing District Grade of "B".
- These improvements were achieved despite the disproportionately high number of English Language Learners and concentration of disadvantaged students in the M-DCPS.

The School Performance Grades released today include the points earned by each school on the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) components. These points only represent 50 percent of the final School Performance Grades for senior high schools; as such they are not presented here. The 2013-2014 School Performance Grades are computed using student results from the FCAT 2.0 Reading, Mathematics, Science, and Writing; and end-of-course exams.

This is the final year of the use of the current formula to compute School Performance Grades, as Florida adopts a new, more rigorous standardized assessment program and a new, accountability system.

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SOUTH FLORIDA SCHOOLS EARN "A" GRADES AS STATE PREPARES FOR NEW GRADING SYSTEM WITH FOCUS ON STUDENT SUCCESS FACTORS

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 11, 2014 – The number of elementary and middle schools earning a preliminary "A" grade increased by 195 (7 percentage points) over last year in the final year of the current grading system, according to preliminary data released today by the Department of Education.

Overall, 962 elementary and middle schools statewide earned the top grade.

"The increase in the number of schools earning an 'A' this year is great news for students and teachers who have worked hard for this success," said Commissioner Pam Stewart. "I appreciate the work by the educators and families and students in South Florida and know they will continue to improve in the future."

Highlights in South Florida include:

Miami-Dade County increased the number of elementary and middle schools earning a
preliminary grade of "A" by 30 schools in 2013-14, with 43 percent of Miami-Dade
County schools now earning an "A" compared to 35 percent in 2012-13. In addition, 22
Miami-Dade County schools improved two or more letter grades between 2012-13 and
2013-14, including four schools that improved from a "D" to an "A" and two schools that
improved from an "F" to a "B."

This is the final year school grades will be calculated using the current formula. The new grading system next year will support the more rigorous Florida Standards and the Florida Standards Assessment which will replace the FCAT. Governor Rick Scott signed legislation in May of 2014 that will make the new school grading formula more simple and transparent.

"The new grading system that will start next year will continue to be crafted with input from parents, teachers and educators," said Stewart. "Its focus on student achievement and gains will help ensure a fair accountability system that helps measure student knowledge of the new Florida Standards."

Starting next year, elementary and middle school grades will be calculated based on the new Florida Standards and will focus on student achievement and learning gains. Next year's school grades will be provided to schools for informational purposes only as the state transitions to the new Florida Standards and Florida Standards Assessment.
