

**MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS REPORT ON PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT PROGRESSION,
SECTION 1008.25 FLORIDA STATUTES**

Provisions of the law (section 1008.25, Florida Statutes) that relate to student progression and the district's school board policies and procedures on student promotion and retention will be contained in the document *Student Progression Plan 2018-2019* once it is approved by The School Board of Miami-Dade County. Major revisions on student promotion and retention to the Student Progression Plan for 2018-2019 include the following:

- New Concordant and Comparative Scores**
 New concordant and comparative scores were adopted by the Florida Board of Education that align with the Grade 10 FSA ELA and the FSA Algebra 1 EOC. New concordant scores required to meet graduation test requirements for students who entered grade 9 in 2018-2019 and beyond are: ACT English and Reading 18 or SAT EBRW 480. The new comparative score required to meet graduation test requirements for the Florida EOC in Algebra 1, for students who entered grade 9 in 2018-2019 and beyond are: PSAT/NMSQT 430 or SAT Math 420 or ACT Math 16. Students who entered grade 9 prior to the school year 2018-2019 may meet their assessment graduation requirement(s) by using previously established concordant and comparative scores or may use the newly adopted scores, if it is to their benefit.
- Computer Science and Technology Instruction**
 As per House Bill 495, provide students in grades K-12 opportunities for learning computer science, including, but not limited to, computer coding and computer programming.
- Career Education Courses that Satisfy High School Credit Requirements**
 As per House Bill 577, a student who earns credit upon completion of an apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship program registered with the Florida Department of Education under chapter 446 to use such credit to satisfy the graduation requirements for fine or performing arts, speech and debate, or practical arts.
